Random Questions:

Here are few questions that you can use to spark conversation once you've finished the book. You can use them in a group discussion or as the basis for a writing assignment.

Has your teacher ever been "Teacher of the Year"?
What do you think makes a teacher "Teacher of the Year"?
Have you ever read "Jeremy Thatcher, Dragon Hatcher"? Did you know that it's a real book?

Lots of things happen a million times in the book. Like Mabel "the Squid" takes a million hours to talk about her first day of school. Mrs. Burke has a million rules. Charlie has read Jeremy Thatcher a million times. Do you think any of these things are possible? Why do you think Charlie uses "a million" to mean a lot?

Hector is the New Kid (even though there are two other new kids). Have you ever been the new kid in class? How did that make you feel? If you've never been the new kid could you imagine what it might be like? What parts do you think would be good? What parts would be bad?

Have you ever befriended the new kid or tried to make them feel welcome in class? What sort of things do you think you could do? Charlie tries to make Hector a part of the games at recess. Do you think that was a good idea? What did you think when Hector came to school with his shoes covered in black marker, just like Charlie's?

If you were the new kid in class do you think you'd like to have Charlie as a friend? Why or why not?

P116: "I always have these great ideas I think will make things better, but things keep going wrong." Have you ever felt like that? Can you think of a time you got into trouble when you were trying to do something good?

After you've read the entire book:

At the end of the book you find out why Mrs. Burke had Charlie sit near Hector – not so Charlie would be neater and quieter, but to be friendly to Hector and to maybe help Hector more easily adjust to being in a new school in a new country. Did you have any idea that's why Mrs. Burke did it? Now that you know, does it change the way you remember things from the book?

In the last chapter, Charlie gets into big trouble, or so he thinks. He throws his shoe to get the ball down for the younger kids. Fortunately for Charlie, it all worked out in the end. What did you think was going to happen after Charlie's shoe got stuck on the roof? After Mr. Schuler took the ball back? After Mrs. Burke found Charlie?
